





Past - Trends - Future

- Population growing at a slowing rate births down, deaths up
- Migration and mobility slowing
 - Harder to attract and retaining the best and brightest.
- Concentrated growth in Front Range both jobs and people
- Aging impacts everything
 - Largest share of future growth is the 65+
 - Prime working age 25-54 becoming smaller share of total pop.
- Growing racial and ethnic diversity.

Big Picture

US - Growth is slowing


- 2010-2020 second slowest decade +22.3M, 7.4%
- 2020-2021 Slowest annual growth rate .1%, 17 states lost population


CO - Growth is slowing

- 2010-2020 + 744,500, 14.8%.
 - 6th ranked percent change, 9th in total growth
- 2020-2021 + 30,500, .5% growth rate
 - Ranked 17th in percent growth and 11th in total growth

Population growth rates are slowing


Colorado and U.S. Growth Rate, 1990 - 2050






95% of the growth in the Front Range vs. 78% from 2000-2010


Components of Population Change 1970-2021





The natural increase of 286,000 accounts for 39% of the population change between 2010 and 2020.




- Population Under 18

 744,518 growth was from the under 18


Population Change by State 2020-2021








- Natural increase of 15,500 accounts for 51% of the population change between 2020 and 2021

 The net migration of 15,000 accounts for 49% of the population change between 2020 and 2021.








Net Migration 2019-2020









CO Unemployment Rate State Rank vs. Net Migration V2021



US Annual Geographic Mobility - State to State Mobility Totals in Thousands and Share of Total Population





Percentage of Workers in the U.S. who teleworked due to the COVID-19 pandemic








Share remote workers, by commuter zone, 2021












Colorado Residential Building Permits

Supply


- Fewer units built
- Slow industry to start and stop
- Supply chain and tight labor
- Public will NIMBY, Anti growth/density
- Water, infrastructure
- Financing

Demand

- Job growth = workers = people
- Aging smaller household size
- Millennials Prime home buying and second home buying
- Gen Z entering first time apt/home
- More money didn't travel or have big wedding, stimulus, interest rates.
- Investors institutional and cannabis firms (often holding vacant)







Colorado Percent Change by Age Group, 2020 to 2030






Implications From Age and Aging

- Consumer demand job creation, occupations, wages
- Labor force older, retirements
- Slower growth in working age especially after 2027
- Lowest Labor Force Participation <24 and 55+
- Highest unemployment <24
- Look at ways at encouraging folks to (re)enter the labor force
- Engaging the 40+
- Housing household size, mobility, owners, accessibility
- Retires aging in place.
- Where will new workers live?

Population Change by Race and Ethnicity






2020 People of Color Share of Population by Age



Summary - Population Trends

- Labor Force National Competition
 - Migration/Mobility slowing, International slowed
 - Slowing young adults after 2027
 - Aging growth in retirees 500K this decade, COVID
 - 55+ slower to rebound important to engage
 - · Marginally Attached day care, senior care
 - Growth in Race and Ethnic Diversity entrants
 - Growth in Gig Transportation Jobs (flexibility)
 - Telework Complement/Competition.
 - Housing and other community services
- Economy
 - · Consumer Demand, Age, Income
