COLORADO LEGISLATIVE SESSION



OVERVIEW

The 2022 Colorado General Assembly convened on January 12 and adjourned May 11, 2022

The Democrats continue to hold majorities in both chambers in the 2022 session.

- The Senate is 21 (D) 14 (R)
- The House is 41(D) 24 (R)
- Governor Polis (D)

Most Diverse Legislature - age, race, gender, religion, ethnicity, etc.

Total of 716 bills introduced (143 were killed)

- 678 in 2021
- 748 in 2020
- 654 in 2019

PPC LEGISLATION OF INTEREST

We took positions on 24 bills (tracked over 60 bills)

- ✓ 15 we supported (all but I passed)
- √ 9 we opposed (2 were killed, and all others were dramatically cut back or turned into studies)
- ✓ Testified on 3 bills, endorsed 8 bills –
- ✓ Partnered with CML, CCI, CACI, C3, Denver Metro Chamber, CHFA, and others to support/oppose bills.




STATE ECONOMY AND BUDGET



COLORADO ECONOMY




Colorado's unemployment rate ticked up to 3.4 percent in August






STATE GENERAL FUND



Inflation

- The key figure for Colorado budgeting is the rate of inflation. Colorado is required to increase K-I2 per pupil funding by inflation or adjust the Budget Stabilization Factor.
- The projected inflation for CY 2022 is significant 7.9 percent.


TABOR Outlook

TABOR Refunds


Colorado is estimated to exceed its TABOR revenue cap by \$3.0 billion in FY 2022-23 and by \$1.6 billion in FY 2023-24.

Cash Fund – Special purpose fund funded through user fees, taxes, and fines for specific purposes and programs.

General Fund - General purpose revenue from taxes (income, sales, and use taxes).

Cash fund revenue saw an increase of 20.0 percent from prior year levels.

 Nearly 70 percent of this increase is attributable to rising severance tax collections, i.e. rising oil and natural gas prices.










BALLOT MEASURES

Proposition 121 State Income Tax Reduction

- Will reduce Colorado's income tax rate from 4.55 percent to 4.4 percent.
- Estimated to reduce General Fund by \$400 million, or 2.4 percent of total revenues.

Issue:

 However, when Colorado is not exceeding its TABOR limit, reducing tax revenues will impact funds available for other state priorities.



BALLOT MEASURES

Proposition 123 Affordable Housing

- Will dedicate 0.1 percent of state income tax revenue for affordable housing.
 - The money shall be used by local governments for land banking, low and middle income multifamily developments, and housing financing.
- Estimated to transfer \$290 million per year once fully implemented.

Issues:


- The state dedicated \$1.2 billion of pandemic relief funds to affordable housing initiatives — much of which has not been allocated yet.
- Would establish a dedicated revenue stream for one state priority.


